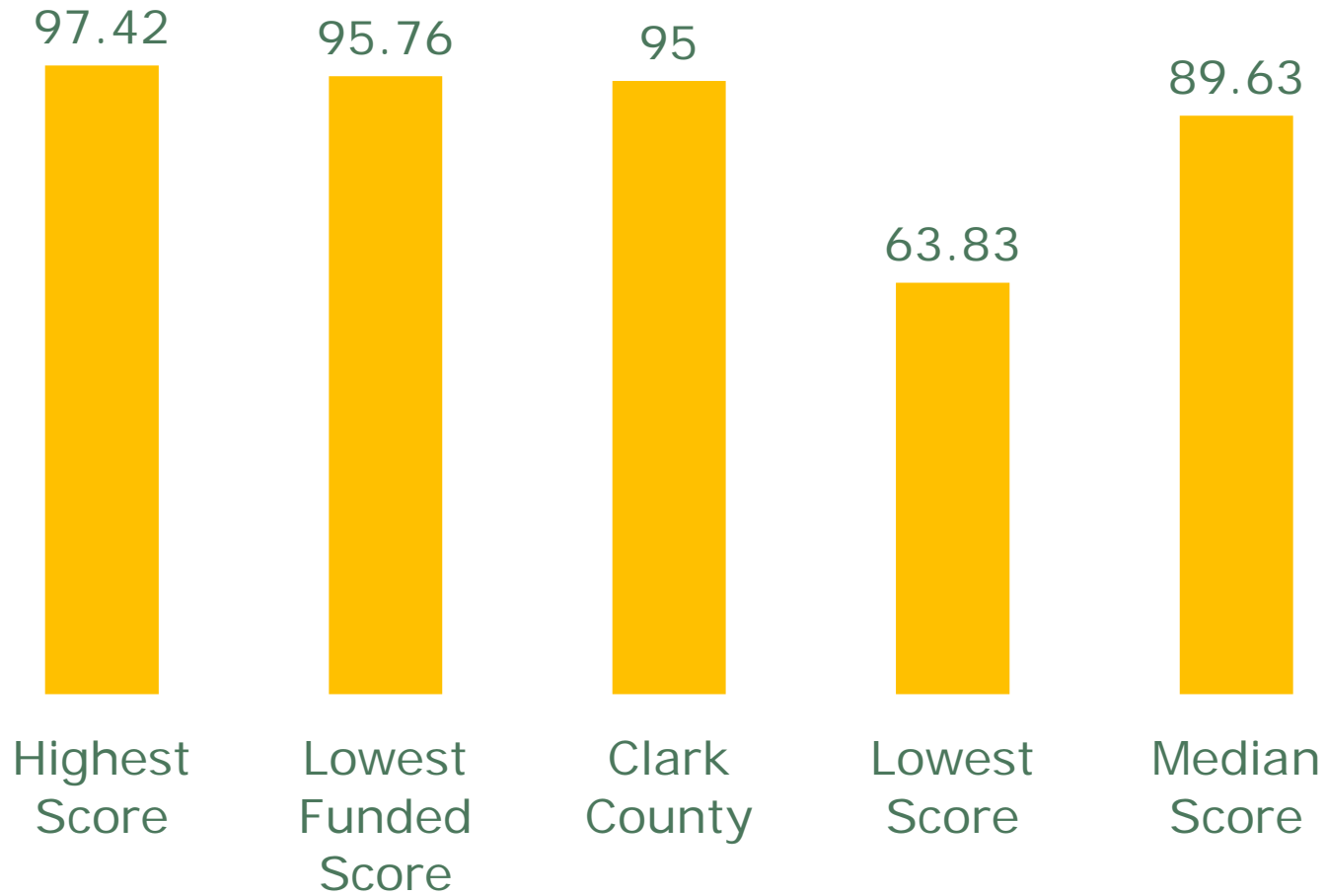

	DESCRIBE THE COLLABORATION	HELP collaborates with the SNH CoC on many levels. Three staff members sit on the numerous working groups and sub-committees, attend local board meetings, and provide community-level trainings on outreach, housing and chronicity documentation.	
	DEMONSTRATION PARTICIPATION	HELP has been an active member of the YHDP sub-committee and has participated in the development of the community application. HELP is assisting with planning activities, and has committed to participate in various stages of community coordination and implementation.	

Needs include:

- More engagement from Child Welfare Agency and Department of Juvenile Justice in regards to discharge planning
- Increase in the number of formal agreements that agencies have with the CoC
- Engage these agencies in the CoC and encourage membership



Financial Resources – 10/10

Strengths include:

- Funding commitments from community partners that exceeded over 3,500 hours with a combined value of over \$145,000
- Funding commitment from CCSS for staffing of 3,120 hours with a value of \$166,800
- Training valued at over \$25,000
- All commitments are memorialized in Letters of Commitment



Data and Evaluation Capacity – 17.83/20

Strengths include:

- Incorporated USICH's Four Core Outcomes for youth
- Our community is using data to explain the composition of the homeless population and understand the gaps in services
- A strategy to prevent and end youth homelessness in our community will be presented at the second annual *Summit to end Youth Homelessness in Southern Nevada* in November 2018

Needs include:

- Improve bed coverage rate
- Include youth voice in determinations of outcomes and success
- Incorporate quantifiable goals such as "reduce by 30%"

- Release of the community's strategic plan to prevent and end youth homelessness (Nov)
- Needs Assessment
- Engage/Re-engage Partners & CoC Members
- Apply for FY18 YHDP
