



Homelessness in Southern Nevada

2021 Homeless Point-In-Time Count & Survey

Every year during the last 10 days of January, communities across the country conduct comprehensive counts of the local homeless populations in order to measure the prevalence of homelessness in each local Continuum of Care.

The 2021 Southern Nevada Point-in-Time Count was a community-wide effort conducted on January 27, 2021. Due to special circumstances this year brought by the COVID-19 pandemic, a random sample of the County was canvassed by teams of service providers and outreach workers. A survey was administered the day and night of the count to persons experiencing homelessness in order to profile their experience and characteristics.

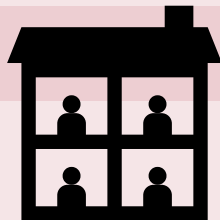
COVID-19 Precautions Taken In Administering Survey
