Policy Priorities

1. Unsheltered Homelessness

- Significantly greater health challenges and experiences of trauma and violence; Connections to health and housing resources
- 2. Rural Areas
- 3. Tribal Lands
- 4. Coordination with a Variety of Stakeholders
 - Affordable housing developers; mainstream service providers; business community; victim service providers; political leaders; healthcare providers
- 5. Advancing Equity
 - BIPOC, LGBTQ+, individuals with disabilities
- 6. Use a Housing First Approach

Maximum Award

- NV-500 = \$14,981,348 for a 36-month project period
 - This is all part of the urban community competition
- Total funds available = \$322,000,000
 - Rural Set Aside = \$54,500,000
 - Urban Set Aside = \$267,500,000
 - Highest award would be \$60,000,000
 - Anticipate 20 40 awards being made in total
 - \$60M x 4 communities = \$240M so this is <u>very</u> competitive

Steps for Preparing the Application

- 1. Develop the Community Plan
- 2. Host a local application process
 - Community-wide RFQ to address items in the Community Plan
 - b) Threshold reviews
 - c) Scoring and Ranking Process
- 3. Develop narrative responses
- 4. Submit application
- 5. When awarded, HUD will contract directly with applicants
 - Applications will be retained by the CoC/CCSS for other funding opportunities over the next 12 months

Comprehensive CoC Plan

Plan must describe CoC's current strategies for:

- Conducting coordinated and comprehensive outreach
- Providing access to low-barrier shelter and other temporary accommodations
- Providing immediate access to low-barrier permanent housing
- Leveraging of mainstream housing and healthcare resources to assist in their efforts to end unsheltered homelessness and stabilize individuals and families in housing
- Increasing access to employment opportunities for those experiencing homelessness
- Supporting underserved communities
- Identifying barriers that led to any disparities in communities being served
- Supporting equitable community development to address barriers
- Involving individuals with lived experience in the decision-making process of the CoC
- Ensuring resources funded under this Special NOFO will contribute to reducing unsheltered homelessness in their geographic area.

Must be informed by people with lived experience.

Scoring – Part 1 determines the order in which CoCs are funded

- CoC Application to include information on:
 - CoC Planning Body
 - Governance Structure
 - Overall Performance
 - Strategic Planning Process
 - Plan for Serving Individuals and Families Experiencing Homelessness with Severe Service Needs
